


Figure 4.2 Normalized backscattering crosssectional area of a sphere as a function of circumference normalized by radar wavelength λ . a = radius. From Skolnik, 1980, Introduction to Radar Systems, with permission of McGraw-Hill Inc.

Back scatter from raindrop

$$\sigma = \frac{\pi^5 |\kappa|^2 D^6}{\lambda^4}$$

Where $|\kappa|^2$ is a parameter related to the complex index of refraction of the material. For water it is normally taken as 0.93, and for ice 0.197.

Radar reflectivity (m² m⁻³):

$$\eta = \sum_{\textit{Unit Volume}} \sigma_i = \frac{\pi^5 |\kappa|^2}{\lambda^4} \sum_{i} D^6 = \frac{\pi^5 |\kappa|^2}{\lambda^4} z$$

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Radar reflectivity factor (m³)

$$z = \sum_{Unit\ Volume} D^6$$
